

Construction Tech Tips

he Technology Committee has been revived under the direction of Jeff Slade, committee Chairman. Each month IT professionals from CASF membership meet to share information about hardware and software they use in their construction businesses. The topic in June was Training and Implement-ation.

It was agreed by all present that in order to be successful in training there must be a buy-in from all levels, especially executive, to be sure that everyone gets onboard. Training needs to be real-time and specific. As an example, if an employee is assigned the task of creating an RFI and requires help with how to do it, a perfect sollution is an on demand tutorial specific to creating an RFI. While several companies still provide classroom training, it is not as effective. Most found that different experience levels among those who attend classes and keeping everyone focused during the class can prove to be challenging.

Miles Willson, Pirtle Construction Company, pointed out that his company has moved to using Adobe Captivate http://www.adobe.com/products/captivate.html to create interactive videos. They try to keep them less than 15minutes long with added humor or illustrations to keep the user's attention. Having used private videos they found that it was expensive and very time intensive. Plus, as things change, editing the videos is very cumbersome.

Adobe Captivate videos are mobile ready, internet ready and you can add tests or click-throughs to monitor the user's progress. They are also similar to Power Point, so sections of each training interactive can be updated and/or changed very quickly.

Jack Horan, Titan Stone, discussed the availability of interactive guides for many software programs that they use. Microsoft is a good example providing interactive guides such as MS Office on the Microsoft Site. http://office.microsoft.com/en -us/word-help/interactiveword-2003-to-word-2007command-reference-guide-HA010074432.aspx allows users to perform a function in Office 2003 and then the guide shows them how to perform the same function in Office 2007.

Eddie Mull, CADD Centers of Florida, explained that his company has been using

Stiles Construction Company is constructing a state-of-the-art 610,000 SF air cargo facility at the northeast corner of Miami International Airport which includes 190,000 SF of cold-storage and 240,000 SF of concrete pavement, all being constructed within a very aggressive schedule and airport logistical constraints.

Steel Fabricators LLC was selected to furnish and install all the structural steel for this project totaling nearly 5 million pounds of steel fabricated by 85 workers running over three shifts. This relates to an astonishing 21,000 shop man hours and 17,000 site man hours erecting 248 tons per week.

Woodland Construction will construct the concrete tilt wall with 204 panels erected in 22 days and over 25,000 CY of concrete poured on this project to date. The extensive site utilities package and concrete aircraft pavements are being constructed by **Redland**

Construction has completed

the Tilt Wall erection for the new classroom building, administration building, and the bridge connecting the two buildings at Fort Lauderdale High School. Many of the three-story tall, 60 feet high panels exceeded 275,000 pounds, which

ranks them among the heaviest panels erected nationwide, according to the Tilt-up Concrete Association.
